President's Message | Norbert Kraich

I looked back at my last five President's Message columns and realized that all of them were focused on the pandemic. That is too much. ENOUGH! NO MORE WITH THE COVID-19! For this message, I promise that I WILL NOT MENTION THE WORDS COVID, PANDEMIC, THE DREADED VIRUS, MASKS, SOCIAL DISTANCING, VACCINES, ANTI-VACCINE CRAZINESS, etc., etc., etc.

So, what am I going to write about? Melinda's beautiful downtown Bethany Beach flowers? The hordes of rampaging tourists? The beautiful, restored wide beach? The severe lack of parking downtown? Why in town are there five ice cream shops (one for dogs)? Three dog-centric shops (including the doggie ice cream parlor)? Four t-shirt emporiums? Three surf shops (but no real surf)? - All in a one-block area? But no place to buy a simple cup of coffee and a daily newspaper???? But then, I guess that black-coffee drinkers and newspaper-buying/reading folks are a waning and literally dying demographic.

No, not going to discuss any of that. Let us discuss briefly, libraries. Something near and dear to all our hearts.

Libraries continue to be extremely popular places for folks to hang out. The latest available statistics show that there were over 1 billion visits by Americans to their local libraries in 2017 (Institute for Museums and Library Services) and that more than 118 million Americans attended the 5 million library programs offered by libraries. That is terrific news.

Yet not everyone praises libraries. According to a story in The Norwalk Hour newspaper (March 2, 2020) and covered by media elsewhere, there was a proposed bill (House Bill 2044) introduced in 2020 in the Missouri State House Legislature by Republican Ben Baker that would penalize

libraries by "...take(ing) aim at libraries and librarians who are making age-inappropriate sexual material available to children...", and "...root out materials lacking serious literary, artistic, political or scientific value". According to the proposed legislation, potential violations would be overseen by 'review boards' who would determine whether materials in libraries contain or promote "...nudity, sexuality, sexual conduct, sexual excitement, or sadomasochistic abuse..." Librarians who defy the review boards by buying and lending such materials would be subject to misdemeanor charges, fines upward of \$500 and a potential jail sentence of up to one year. Thankfully, the legislation is lying dormant in the Missouri State House with no hearings scheduled and is not currently on the House calendar. According to the story this is not an isolated incident. State Legislators in Colorado and Maine both attempted to pass similar legislation in the past, but their efforts failed. One can only hope that these efforts were 'one-offs' and that most folks in state legislatures realize that librarians are competent professionals who make decisions based on reality and training rather than misplaced, erroneous emotions. There have always been threats and efforts to ban or censure books over the years but generally sanity prevails.

But not always is the concern about what goes into libraries. Often things have been taken, read stolen, from libraries that are quite unusual. I came across an interesting article a

year or so ago that caught my attention. Tony Dunnell reported in Mental Floss Magazine (February 2020), a quirky on-line publication targeted at the curious, on Surprising Things Stolen from Libraries. These include such items as:

- A 400-year-old Geneva Bible, published in 1615, stolen from Pittsburgh's Carnegie Library along with numerous other rare books over a two-decade period. The thievery was apparently an inside job by library employees and carried out undetected. The bible was eventually recovered many years later at a museum in the Netherlands when the museum owners realized it had been stolen before being donated.

- Columbus's first letter from the New World, stolen from the Biblioteca Nazionale Marciana (Library of St. Mark) in Venice, Italy sometime between 1985-1988. It was not recovered until 2003 when a collector unwittingly purchased it from a rare book dealer and investigators tracked it down. The item's value was estimated at \$1.3 million.

- A 'Holey Dollar', the first currency minted in Australia, stolen from an armored glass display case in the State Library of New South Wales. Only 300 of

these 'dollars' exist today and this one has never been recovered.

- Eight rare Latter Day Saints history books stolen from the Brigham Young University Library in Provo, Utah by a thief who switched bar codes on the rare items with other books when he checked them out. The books were valued at \$300 each. The culprit was caught when he attempted to sell the books to a rare book dealer and special markings were discovered that showed the books belonged to the university library.

- A fiberglass skeleton from the Adelaide City Library in Australia by three men pretending to be city council workers. The men were caught on closed circuit cameras casually walking out of the library and boarding a bus with the skeleton but have never been apprehended.

Thankfully, the good folks at our beloved South Coastal Library (SCL) do not have to deal with such shenanigans on a regular basis, just overdue books, sunburned tourists looking for beach-reads, and shelf-misplacements by browsing patrons.

Summer has finally arrived, and we all can get back to some semblance of normality. During this traumatic year, our

all-volunteer Friends of the South Coastal Library (FOSCL) group has continued to support the SCL as it has been doing since forming in 1988. Even though we have had to cancel our Annual FOSCL Book Sale, we are very excited to report that our major fund-raising event, the Beach & Bay Cottage (B&BC) Tour will be held virtually in July! Please see the accompanying story on this important event later in this newsletter and please purchase a ticket(s) to enjoy this fantastic cottage tour.

We will continue to provide on-going financial help beyond the funding provided by Sussex County to enhance library services and programs to make certain that the SCL is the best community resource possible for our patrons. Thanks to all our contributors, volunteers, sponsors, and library staff to make this so. Meeting **room(s)**, computer classroom and children's program room remain unavailable through the summer, at least.

Vikki Manning FOSCL Board Member and B&BC Tour Chair

IN MEMORIAM Victoria Manning | 1949-2021

FOSCL lost an important friend when Vikki Manning died on February 12, 2021. Vikki served as Chairman of the Beach & Bay Cottage Tour (B&BC Tour) from 2000 - 2003 and was responsible for elevating the Tour to new levels of sophistication and excellence.

Vikki was born in Chicago and spent over 30 years in the magazine industry, moving from Chicago to New York in 1976. After working with many magazines, she ended

her career with Conde Nast, spending time in their offices all over the world, traveling the globe. Vikki moved to Delaware in 1992, splitting her time between Wilmington and South Bethany.

Vikki, following the footsteps of Betty Frank and Betsy Baxter, became chairman of the 9th Annual Beach & Bay Cottage Tour in 2000. That year, she introduced the concept of an Honorary Chairman with that role filled by then Governor and Mrs. Tom Carper. She also introduced the cocktail reception to honor the owners of the homes featured on the Tour that year. The Tour was a sellout and raised over \$50,000 for FOSCL.

For the 10th Annual Tour in 2001, another sellout raising over \$50,000, Vikki inaugurated the wearing of surgical booties in the homes. In 2002,

another sellout Tour under Vikki's leadership raised over \$80,000, and Tour participants were given complimentary copies of Chesapeake Home magazine. In subsequent years, complimentary copies of Delaware Beach Life and Coastal Style magazines have been a regular gift for Tour patrons.

During Vikki's final year as Tour chair, she introduced the tote bags in 2003 for the 12th Annual Tour. Then Senator Tom Carper and his wife continued their tradition as Honorary Chairs for the Tour. With another sellout crowd and many donations and advertisements, the Tour raised another \$80,000. In 2004, Vikki was honored by a tribute from the Office of the Governor of the State of Delaware for her outstanding service to FOSCL. The total amount raised to support FOSCL and the library under Vikki's years chairing the Tour was over \$265,000. Vikki served on the Board of Directors of FOSCL during the four years that she chaired the Tour.

Vikki's energy, attention to detail, managerial skills, innovative ideas and business acumen resulted in successful Tours with features that are still part of what makes the B&BC Tour such an outstanding event.

Interview with Kathy Green

I talked with Kathy Green who chairs the annual Beach & Bay Cottage Tour (B&BC Tour), which is so popular within the community and raises significant funds that help the South Coastal Library (SCL) expand its services and programs.

What is involved in putting the B&BC Tour together every year?

Getting ready for the Tour each year is a year-round effort by a group of very dedicated volunteers. Even before one tour is over, the committee is working on the next year's Tour. In addition to the core committee of 24, Kathy and the committee depend on over 600 volunteers to help bring the Tour to fruition.

The Tour is indeed a team effort, but it all starts with the selection of the houses generously shared by the home owners. Additionally, there are the tote bags and fans to be designed and ordered, the logo to be designed, sponsors and advertisers to be solicited, programs, sneak-peek articles, flyers, newsletters, house write-ups, and advertisements to be written, logistics such as parking and busing of patrons to be determined, permits for signs to be obtained, house coordinators and hostesses for each house to be recruited and assigned, and coordinating with the towns where there are Tour homes.

How do you select the houses?

A variety of factors go into selecting the houses. Anywhere from 8 to 10 homes are chosen from within the SCL service area. Kathy and the committee aim for a variety of styles from ocean-front houses with spectacular views to charming cottages from the 1920's full of personality. Additionally, new builds or creative renovations, large homes and small, professionally decorated and homeowner decorated as well as full- time homes and second-homes are considered. Logistics and parking availability are also major factors. If one house is outside of the traditional Bethany Beach area, then the committee attempts to identify another house nearby to help consolidate the overall Tour footprint.

Among the logistical challenges of the Tour is that the Tour footprint should be compact enough so that the Tour may be completed in one day and, ideally, Tour attendees should also be able to complete the Tour by bicycle. Each house must provide a good interior traffic pattern as patrons tour throughout the house. Additionally, the safety of the Tour guests is key. Of course, these criteria apply to "normal times" when people actually visit the houses rather than tour virtually as will be the case in 2021.

Staffing the houses with hostesses is of significant importance. The Tour hostesses are the face of the Tour! There are morning and afternoon shifts, and some houses are large enough to need 25 people per shift, meaning that the committee will need to recruit up to 100 hostesses just for one house.

Kathy and the committee are constantly on the lookout for houses to include on the Tour. Recommendations come from architects, designers, builders, professional decorators, previous-Tour homeowners, and friends of the Library. Once the first two to three houses are selected, then the overall footprint of the Tour begins to take place.

What challenges did the Covid-19 virus pose for you?

The Covid-19 virus started to become a factor early in March 2020, the peak time for the Tour committee to finalize its major preparations for the upcoming season's Tour. These preparations require significant expenditures including the ordering of the tote bags, programs, fans, creating publicity advertisements, hiring of buses for transportation, and finalizing many items that go into making the Tour a success.

During this uncertain and concerning time, the B&BC Tour

committee had to make a very difficult decision regarding the 2020 Tour. By unanimous vote, the committee decided to cancel the 2020 Tour. The decision was extraordinarily difficult both in terms of the committee's disappointment in the cancellation of a Bethany signature event as well as the loss of revenue from a major fundraiser. The Tour provides a significant amount of the funds that Friends of the South Coastal Library (FOSCL) gives to the library to supplement and expand its services, programs, and materials. Nevertheless, with no clear outcome from the threat of the virus at that time, cancellation was the only sensible option.

Last fall, Kathy and the committee initiated a discussion around the idea of a virtual Tour for the 2021 season. At that time, there was not an approved vaccine and there was no way of knowing what July of 2021 would be like. In the meantime, the Ocean City Art League held a virtual home Tour in October 2020, and it was successful.

However, going virtually posed great new challenges in uncharted territory in terms of what's involved and of expenditures. Many new budget items replaced traditional expenditures and revenue sources. There was no need for buses, but expenditures for videographers, and writing of storyboards, together with a complete website redesign had to be achieved. There was no need for parking logistics, but instead for the development of precise timing of the video narration. With the Tour going virtual, new types of sponsors had to be found. The program book went digital on the website.

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Kathy and her committee had a very steep learning curve, and they were up to the task. On a positive note, going virtual brings the convenience of the Tour to those that cannot attend an 'in person' Tour due to physical limitations or no proximity to the Tour's houses.

By the way, people may buy their tickets for the Tour only online this year.

How did you get involved with the B&BC Tour?

Kathy had planned her family's vacations to Bethany Beach to coincide with the B&BC Tour. She was always interested in homes, designs, and is very people oriented. In 2010, Kathy's house was recommended to the Tour Chairs for the 2011 Tour. Kathy started helping with the house Tour that same year. The next year, 2012, she co-chaired the B&BC Tour, and in 2013, became the Tour Chair. This year's Tour is the 29th Annual Tour, and Kathy's 10th as Chair or Co-Chair.

Along with her organizational skills, Kathy brings an uncanny ability to keep the big picture in mind all the while paying meticulous attention to details and all, without micromanaging. She has great faith in her committee of 24, volunteers of 600, and very much calls it a Team effort. Kathy works well with a variety of people and is definitely the calm during a storm.

Kathy was born in Chicago and she is still a Bears and Cubs fan. She met her husband, David, in college, and they have lived in Texas and Pennsylvania before retiring to this area. Kathy owned and ran Seaquels, an upscale, furniture consignment shop in Ocean View, for 10 years. Kathy and David have three children, three grandchildren and a wonderful yellow lab, Scarlet. Kathy is an avid reader, loves to cook, to travel, and is passionate about her family, her community, animals, and the beach.

What makes the B&BC Tour so popular?

People enjoy viewing a variety of houses to see what's out there, to gather ideas to adapt to decorating their own houses, or to see the latest styles before renovation. Other owner's homes embody so much of a person's personality, that they hold a

lot of interest for Tour patrons. It's always interesting to get a glimpse of life in South Coastal Delaware!

What happens with the proceeds?

The purpose of the Tour is to help the SCL in Bethany Beach. All the proceeds directly benefit SCL by funding programs, books and services for the community and much more. FOSCL also sponsors a partnership with the LBES where it invites authors to speak about their books and provides a free copy of the book to students. See the article on School Partnership in this Edition on page 2.

Ultimately, the community gets the funds back in increased resources through the library. Many believe that a library is the heart and center of the community, our South Coastal Library, is a very important community asset.

Any insights into next year's Tour?

Ideally, Kathy would love to have an in-person Tour for 2022. The decision will be made in the fall. On the other hand, a virtual tour adds to the convenience of the Tour patrons' ability to view the houses from their own home.

In all cases, the feel, character, and charm of the Tour houses is what the committee hopes each Tour Patron will embrace.

What are the key takeaways for the 2021 Virtual Tour?

For this year, Tour patrons may do the following:

- ✿ Watch the Tour from ANYWHERE in the world.
- ✿ Watch the Tour ANYTIME from July 18 through July 31.
- ✿ Watch the Tour AS MANY TIMES as they like from any electronic device.

As Kathy says, "If you live here full-time, you have a house at the beach. If you live here part-time, you have a beach house." This saying reflects the different ways that people view their houses and that the Tour tries to capture.


